


ASA National Softball Hall of Fame & Stadium

Also located on the grounds are the 1890 Shepherd House, an 1897 one-room school, and a 1900 working farm.

Take a tour on the 1863 Replica Locomotive Centennial Train through the Zoo's hoofed stock section, or paddle around Zoo Lake in a two-person swan paddle boat.

The Oklahoma Railway Museum also collects, conserves and interprets artifacts, rolling stock, and structures that reflect the heritage of railroad and street rail transportation in the 19th and 20th centuries in Oklahoma.

Recently added are a six-lane rubber duck racing contest and the Neal Simpson mine where you can pan for treasure.

Overholser Mansion

Built by early-day entrepreneur Henry Overholser, this amazing home was the first mansion in Oklahoma City. The mansion features late 19th century architecture with original furnishings and hand-painted, canvas-covered walls.

Outside, world-class sculptures can be found on the plaza.
